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I. Course Description

This course introduces computer applications and a selection of creative tools and the skills necessary to be successful in today's digital world. Students will learn essential design principles for the creation of digital content and apply those skills by completing projects in both Adobe Photoshop and Illustrator. These projects will teach students how to create a well thought out composition to convey a clear message to a target audience. Effective information presentation skills will be developed by producing and showcasing a portfolio of work using Microsoft PowerPoint.

II. Learning Outcomes

- Identify essential design principles in areas such as layout design, color theory, and composition
- Effectively choose and execute a creative approach to given design problems
- Learn and exercise basic working proficiency in Photoshop, Illustrator, and PowerPoint
- Discuss and examine design solutions to be able to provide useful feedback
- Develop effective skills and techniques for presenting digital content

III. Software

It is highly recommended that you subscribe to the Adobe Creative Cloud due to the limited amount of time that the lab will be open for you to work in.

IV. Evaluation

Students will be evaluated on the completion of several projects in both Adobe Illustrator and Adobe Photoshop as well as their attendance, midterm, and final presentation. For the assignments completed using Photoshop and Illustrator, grades are based on the implementation of learned design principles in addition to the proper use of software tools.

Both the final output image and the working file are evaluated. Final presentations will consist of all work that is produced for the semester. Grades are based on slide composition and the ability to present this material confidently and within the given amount of time. The midterm is a written exam that will test students' knowledge of design principles as well as questions related to proper workflow in photoshop. Attendance in all classes is mandatory. Students not present during attendance will be marked absent unless the professor is notified of your late arrival at the end of the class. Every 3 lates will be marked as 1 absence and 7 unexcused absences is recorded as an automatic fail.
